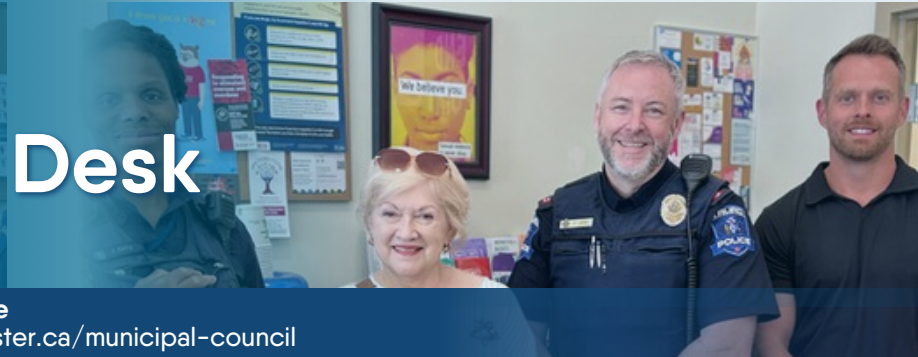

Progress Monitoring Committee, Mass Casualty

Commission Recommendations: As the appointed representative for the Municipalities of Colchester, Cumberland, East Hants and West Hants on the Progress Monitoring Committee (PMC) for the Mass Casualty Commission's (MCC) recommendations, I want to advise you the three-year term of the Committee has now ended. It has been challenging, intense, heartbreaking, and yet, rewarding, to work with the expertise, sincerity and professionalism of the committee, the PMC Secretariat, as well as with families who suffered the greatest impact and loss.

Accountability on the progress of the recommendations from the MCC final report and supporting transparency to the public on that progress, was key. The Federal and Provincial Governments and the RCMP put a lot of work into advancing and implementing the recommendations. Commitment has been made by each to finalize work that has not been completed and follow up to have it implemented. 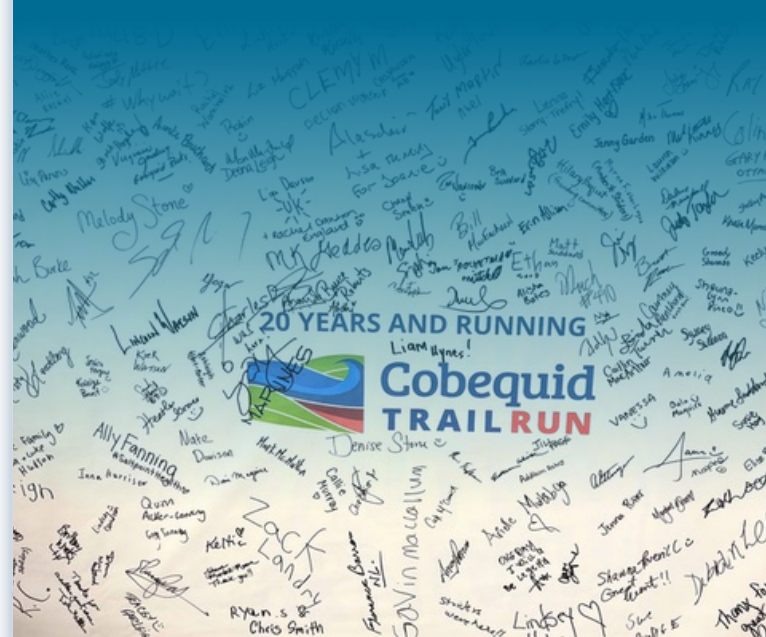

Police Advisory Board

Committee Overview and Board Member Profiles

The Police Advisory Board (PAB) is a Committee of Council consisting of seven voting members; three members of Council; three citizen representatives and one provincial citizen representative. Citizen representative terms last four years, while Council terms last two years. Also sitting on the Board, as non voting members, are the CAO of the Municipality of

Colchester and the Staff Sergeant of the RCMP, Bible Hill Detachment.

The Board meets at least four times a year, receiving updates on staffing, call volumes and types, and providing input on the annual performance goals of the RCMP. Profiles of the current Police Advisory Board are below.

Lisa Patton is Councillor for District 8 and current Chair of the PAB. Lisa works with NS Department of Agriculture, is a community volunteer, past chair of the School Advisory Committee at NRES, past vice chair of the Colchester East Hants Hospital Foundation, past president of Colchester County 4-H Council, current member on several boards including: Steps on Arthur Foundation, NSPE Oversight Committee and volunteer with Antique Farm Equipment Museum. Lisa is also Chair of two other Committees of Council, Flood Advisory Committee and the Appeals Committee. Lisa wanted to serve on the PAB because she believes strong communities are built on trust, communication, and accountability. Lisa wanted the opportunity to strengthen the relationship between the public and police services, bring forward community concerns, and support initiatives that improve public safety for everyone.

Victoria Lomond is current Vice-Chair of the PAB and an Operations Manager at STEPs on Arthur, with over 25 years of experience in the human services sector. She leads with dignity, integrity and respect. Victoria served as a Municipal Councillor for Colchester County (2021-2024) and remains actively involved in her community as Co-Chair of a local Community Health Board and a member of the Higgins Mountain Community Liaison Committee. Victoria is committed to strengthening communication, promoting transparency, and supporting collaborative, responsive policing that reflects the needs and values of rural communities.

Roger Miller has been an active member of the Canadian Security industry for over 35 years, currently serving as President of Northeastern Protection Service in Dartmouth, and was an inaugural member of the Stewiacke Police Advisory Board. Roger has received training from The Technical University of Nova Scotia (TUNS), The U.S. State Department, Royal Canadian Mounted Police and the Crime Prevention Society of Nova Scotia and volunteered with several local organizations including Stewiacke Legion, Stewiacke Baptist Church and South Colchester Minor Hockey. Roger wanted to join the PAB as he saw it as an opportunity to use his professional skills to support his community. Roger's understanding of community policing stemmed from his time as an Auxiliary Constable

with the Cole Harbour RCMP during the 1990's. Roger believes that the community and the police play equal roles in modern policing, and for that reason, there needs to be open communication.

Greg Carver resides in Upper Kempton and is currently a part-time Commissionaire who runs an online strength coaching business. After 15 years with Rogers and an MBA from Dalhousie, Greg spent 14 years in Toronto owning StrengthBox, a community-focused gym, while serving as an Auxiliary Officer with Toronto Police Service's 55 Division and Vice-Chair of its Community Police Liaison Committee. He led fundraising for youth and mental health causes, including ProAction Cops & Kids. Greg joined the Colchester PAB to bring his community-policing experience to Colchester's public safety priorities.

Tom Kennedy resides in Upper Onslow and is enjoying retired life. With a background in business, Tom is more focused on his community, its wellbeing and security in his retirement. Tom believes his life experience can help with implementing progressive programs that reflect the current values of the community.

Nigel Leggett is the Councillor for District 6. Nigel sits on several committees including the PAB; Carbon Free Colchester Implementation Committee; Citizen Monitoring Committee, Lower Harmony Wind Turbines; Debert Business Park Advisory Committee; Joint Flood Advisory Committee; Debert Water Utility Committee; and Truro & Colchester Chamber of Commerce

Charlene Fletcher is the Councillor for District 10. In addition to the PAB, Charlene also serves on the Appeals Committee; Colchester East Hants Library Board; Citizens Monitoring Committee, Higgins Mountain Wind Turbines; and the Physician Recruitment Committee.

72 Hours – Are You Prepared?

Emergency Management personnel strongly encourage citizens to be prepared to take care of yourself and your family for at least the first 72 hours after an emergency or disaster occurs.

This timeframe is critical as it can take emergency response agencies some time to reach you. The best way to be prepared is to remember these 3 key points:

1 Know Your Risks

As residents in your community, you are familiar with the events that are possible. Whether your region is susceptible to **flooding, extended power outages, hurricanes, transportation accidents** or another event, it is always best to know what the risks in your community are.



2 Make a Plan

Every household should have some type of emergency plan. Plans can be created in as little as 20 minutes! It is the best way to ensure that the people in the household can contact each other if they are not together when an emergency strikes. **Emergency plans often include household safety, plan for your pets, special health needs and emergency contacts.**



3 Prepare Emergency Kits

Emergency Kits should have the **basic needs to sustain yourself and your family for that crucial first 72 hours.** This kit should be stored in one location that is easily accessible and everyone knows where to find it.

A basic kit should include:

☐ Water – 2 litres per day per person



☐ Foods that do not spoil (Non Perishable)



☐ Copy of Your Emergency Plan



☐ Battery or Windup Radio



☐ Flashlight



☐ Extra Keys for the Vehicles and House



☐ Cash (smaller bills) & Change



☐ First Aid Kit



☐ Cell Phone Chargers



☐ Manual Can Opener

Hilden Sidewalk

The County has recently installed a new sidewalk on Hwy 2, Hilden, from Avalon Avenue to Edwards Road. This addition will provide residents with a safer, more accessible route for walking and help improve connectivity within the area.

A reminder to residents, the Village of Bible Hill, Town of Truro and Village of Tatamagouche own and maintain their own sidewalks. Sidewalks located outside the Town and Villages in Colchester County are owned and maintained by the County.



Storm Drain & Ditch Maintenance

As we head into the Fall season, Public Works crews are busy preparing our roads and drainage systems for the wetter months ahead. Proper maintenance of storm drains, culverts and roadside ditches is an important part of preventing water from pooling on roads and helping to reduce the risk of flooding.

Residents can help by keeping leaves, branches, grass clippings and other debris away from storm drains and culverts near their properties. A clear drainage path allows rainwater to flow freely and help prevent blockages, particularly during periods of heavy rainfall.

Snowplow Safety Tips:



1. Stay Alert

Winter weather can create poor visibility, so always be aware of your surroundings, keep your eyes and ears open for snowplows.

2. Be Visible

Wear bright-coloured clothing and reflective gear when walking, biking, or working near roadways or sidewalks while these are being plowed.

3. Stay Behind the Plow

Snowplow blades can extend beyond the centerline and the edge of the paved road, leaving less room than may appear.

4. Give Snowplows Plenty of Space

Never crowd or pass a snowplow. Maintain a safe following distance.

5. Be patient

Snowplows travel at slower speeds. Allow extra time and distance to slow down or stop when traveling behind one.

6. Be Careful Playing in Snowbanks

Snowplow operators cannot see if children are playing behind or inside snowbanks. Please avoid playing in road-side snowbanks during plowing operations.

All garbage taken to the Balefill Facility, whether residential or business, **MUST BE** in clear bags or you will be asked to re-bag into clear bags.

Cash, personal cheques or INTERAC are accepted as payment. Credit cards are NOT accepted.

Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR) Reminder

As of December 1, 2025, new materials that can be recycled curbside are as follows:

Paper Recycling

- Laminated paper and gift bags
- Gift wrapping paper
- Coated paper plate (Clean)
- Pizza Box (Clean and empty)

Containers Recycling

- Multi-layer containers (ice cream, frozen juice, cups and bowls, coffee cups);
- Plastic tubes (toothpaste, deodorant, hand cream);
- Plastic packaging (candy dispensers, bottles/pumps, pails, garden pots, seedling trays);
- Wire hangers

As of December 1, 2025, several items are NO LONGER ACCEPTED in the curbside recycling program, these are as follows:

- Books – (can be donated including at community library boxes or shared. Otherwise, will be included in the garbage stream)
- Pots and pans – (may be donated or are considered scrap metal. Otherwise, will be included in the garbage stream)

There are materials that can be recycled at designated depots, these are as follows:

- Styrofoam/Foam Packaging – styrofoam, styrofoam packaging & meat trays (empty, remove film wrap & absorbent pads from trays)
- Aerosol container – hairsprays, air fresheners, food spray (non-hazardous, empty, lids & caps on)
- Flexible plastics – candy wrapper, chip & snack bags, cereal bag liner, bubble wrap

Please Note: Separate materials from your refundables and separate materials overall (all styrofoam in one bag, all aerosol in one bag & so on)

Plastic bottles, paper bags, and even jars containing sharps and needles are among the items that repeatedly end up on sorting lines at the Materials Recovery Facility.

For the safety of our staff, please adhere to the following precautions:

- DO NOT put sharps in plastic bottles, paper bags or juice boxes for disposal
- Pick up a free Safe Sharps container at your local pharmacy
- Place your sharps/needles into the Safe Sharps container
- When the container is full, return the sealed container to your local pharmacy
- DO NOT place sharps in recycling or garbage bags because they can seriously harm staff who are handling these bags. For your safety and the safety of others, sharps should only be placed in a Safe Sharps Container."
